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Thy Kingdom Come

As we look around the world, in our neighbourhoods, work places and even in our families, there is plenty of evidence of people looking for power - it’s nothing new! Kingdoms - and Queendoms - come and go. Some bring stability and peace, others not.

At a time of Roman occupation in Palestine Jesus taught his disciples to pray to the Father and ask ‘thy kingdom come’.

I wonder what was going through the minds of those disciples as they heard these words said. What type of kingdom were they anticipating?

I wonder if they could have envisaged a kingdom which, among other things, promoted servanthood. Click on this [link](#) to hear a King’s commitment to this kingdom value.

I wonder if the disciples were also confused as they tried to understand how “Our Father” could also be head of a kingdom. The idea that they could pray to someone who had the power of a king but who offered the loving relationship of a father was a big thing.



‘Thy Kingdom Come’ is an Anglican initiated resource to be used from Ascension to Pentecost, encouraging people to intentionally pray this line of the prayer for individuals over 11 days - this year 18-28 May.

The call is to pray. When ‘thy kingdom comes’ it de-thrones other kingdoms, and communities are improved. Let’s pray:

An Exercise

The Lord’s Prayer

Listen to this [version](#) of the Lord’s Prayer. Over the next 11 days pray just one line of this prayer per day and notice how God’s kingdom comes.

1. [Our Father in heaven](#)
Picture the one to whom you are praying.
2. [Hallowed be your name](#)
As you are on the move, intentionally notice God’s presence and be worshipful.
3. [Your kingdom come](#)
Pray for a person you know to accept God and his values.
4. [Your will be done on earth as in heaven](#)
Pray for a confusing situation that needs God’s direction.
5. [Give us today our daily bread](#)
Pray for a people group that is in need of basics to live on.
6. [Forgive us our sins](#)
Stop often - confess wrong thoughts, actions, and words.
7. [As we forgive those who sin against us](#)
Think of someone who you need to forgive and do it!
8. [Lead us not into temptation](#)
What might you be tempted by? Ask for strength to resist.
9. [But deliver us from evil](#)
Pray about something that you need relief from.
10. [For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours, now and forever](#)
Marvel on the bigness of the kingdom and give thanks.
11. [Amen](#)
Notice God’s presence and respond with this word.
